conversations regarding trust, fairness and court access . As Municipal Courts in the State of Missouri were undergoing comprehensive legislative changes after the events in Ferguson, Missouri, we felt the Kansas City Municipal Division would be an ideal candidate for this project. After a competitive process, the Kansas City Municipal Division was chosen as 1 of 6 projects in the Country.

Josh: As we started this project, we collected nearly 1,000 court user surveys during the first week of May 2019. The results and themes of that survey help shape and guide the topics for today. When everyone came in today, you should have received and completed a pre-survey. You will also receive a post-survey at the end of this event . If you complete both, you will receive your \$25.00 gift card for participating today. These surveys are being administered by all 6 grant recipients in their projects as well. They go directly to the National Center who will send us a summary of any data that could help our court improve, but they do not send us your individual answers. It is our hope that the information gathered from you will be collected and used to help create a nationwide toolkit for other communities to engage in similar conversations with their jurisdictions. Also, as explained in the consent letter you received, the national center may contact you for follow-up but you can always decline.

Megan: Today we want to hear your ideas and concerns regarding trust, fairness, and court access. We want to encourage and open and frank conversation about courts in general, including any interactions, both positive and negative, you or a family or friends may have had with the Kansas City Municipal Court. We are not here to discuss specific court cases or their outcomes, but more of an overall picture of how the community perceives justice in the Kansas City judicial system. While court resources are available (in the back of the room) to provide general assistance and to share some brochures and resources, and court officials are in the back of the room, they are not here to judge you or what input you may have . Again, we are here to listen to you.

Josh: Data KC, a team from the City Manager's Office, that is focused on supporting data-driven management in city operations, is here to help theme the ideas from our table discussions. They will gather common ideas, thoughts and suggestions to present an overall picture and focus from your ideas today .

Megan: Court Administration after the three community conversation sessions, will identify areas of concern, possible actions steps and timelines to take to the Court en banc (the judges) for consideration. We will then report back to the community on findings and progress through the website and email communication .

Josh: Your lead facilitators are not court employees, but rather community leaders. There also will be a facilitator located at each table and they will facilitate the discussions and help you identify what is important to you. They are assisted by notetakers who will help capture your ideas thru this engagement. I would now like to introduce to you, our lead facilitators for today, Damon Daniel and Jonathan Morris.

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| <p>Jonathan: We have designed this Community Conversation so Municipal Court can learn what is important to you. We want to know your feedback and ideas. Let me give you a quick rundown of how this will work and who is doing what.</p> <p>We have organized this event around three important topics: Trust, Fairness and Access. We have 10 questions we will be asking you today. The process will move quickly so we want to make sure you are focused on the right question. Each question will appear on the screen one at a time and then you will have a few minutes to write down your answer and discuss it at your table.</p> <p>Step 1. Question appears on the screen .</p> <p>Step 2. You write your ideas on the post-it notes in front of you.</p> <p>Step 3. Your table facilitator will ask you to share your ideas at your table.</p> <p>Step 4. The Theme Team will collect all post-its and look for common themes that emerge.</p> <p>Step 5. The common themes will be presented on the screen.</p> <p>Step 6. We will move on to the next question and repeat the process.</p> <p>So who will be doing what?</p> <p>Lead Facilitators are responsible for posing the discussion questions, assisting the Theme Team as needed and keeping everything on schedule.</p> <p>Table Facilitators are responsible for two things: 1} make sure each person gets a chance to share and 2} keep the discussion on the right topic. They can also help take notes if needed.</p> <p>Notetakers are responsible for making sure you get your ideas written down and to help write as needed . Each question has its own color of Post-it note. Be sure to write only one. idea per Post-it and try to write in short sentences or phrases. You can explain your answer more during the discussion. Please write so others can read it and ask for assistance from someone else if you need help.</p> <p>Runners will take your post-it notes to the Theme Team.</p> <p>Theme Team has a difficult but fun part. Their job is to review all post-its and look for common themes that emerge. They will report out the themes on the Power Point. Please NOTE: The Theme Team will identify the most common themes AND all ideas will be captured in the transcript of the event even if they don't appear among the most common themes.</p> <p>Court staff are here primarily to listen and learn . As Josh mentioned at the beginning, the Court Administrators will also be available at the Resource table in the back of the room a little bit later in the discussion.</p> <p>We want everyone to be able to participate in each discussion, so please pitch in and help your neighbor if the need arises . 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| | <p>Jonathan: We also brought Clicker technology today to help us do some polling. These are easy and fun to use and your responses are anonymous. Please pick up a clicker and just press the Orange button one time. This is your On button. Anytime your screen goes blank, just hit the orange button and it will turn right back on. To vote, a question will appear on the screen up here and you simply choose A, B, C, D, or E for your answer and push that button on your clicker. You don't have to do anything other than that to vote. And, if you aren't sure if your vote counted...vote again.
